holiday on *May 26th* is set aside to remember our fallen service members who fought in foreign wars. Occurring on the last Monday of May each year, our parish conducts a memorial service at the Greek section in Memorial Park Cemetery in Skokie at 10am Monday morning. Please join together in prayer and support for one another that day.

The end (**Apodosis**) of the **Paschal** season will be marked with Liturgy on *Wednesday May 28th*. This is the last day we sing Christos Anesti...Christ is Risen... Our sister parish of **Ascension** in Lincolnshire celebrates their parish feast day that evening and the following morning. We will have Liturgy here at SSPP on Thursday morning May 29th.

Our second annual **Animal/Pet Blessing service** has been rescheduled to *Saturday June 7^d at 4Pm*. Please be sure your pet is leashed, caged or otherwise under control to make sure everyone (including the pets) is safe and happy.

I would like to welcome parish council member *George Karagiannis* as our new **Stewardship ministry chair** and thank *Julie Stefanski* for serving in this role for the last three years.

The 2025 Archdiocese Stewardship Theme is “*See Our Church as it Could Be.*” A secondary, related theme is “*Your Own from Your Own, We Offer to You.*” The latter is the petition/prayer from the Divine Liturgy when the priest raises the gifts of bread and wine. The point is whatever we give to God is not really ours. Rather it is a gift from Him that we offer back to Him with thanksgiving. Regarding the former theme, our parish can only reach its potential if we generously and sacrificially offer back what God has already given to us. In the coming weeks, we will have increased communications around the topic of stewardship.

God’s guideline for giving is the tithe (10%). He gives us everything but only asks for ten percent in return. That’s a pretty good deal. With a total (operations & capital) annual parish budget of \$1.7M we encourage everyone to strive towards tithing (10%) but **suggest a minimum of four percent (4%) annual giving.**

MODERN HERESIES - INTRO

Heresy means false belief or teaching and is a very important concern for Christians. The Church teaches that incorrect belief leads to inappropriate and sinful behavior. This is why many Church Fathers and Saints throughout history fought fiercely to maintain the true Faith in Christ. In this article I will examine several modern heresies to understand what they are and how they influence us. In a future article I will discuss ways to overcome them so we may be guided on the right path towards salvation in Jesus Christ.

Heresy

From a Greek word signifying (1) a choice, (2) the opinion chosen, and (3) the sect holding the opinion. In the Acts of the Apostles ([5:17](#); [15:5](#); [Isaiah 24:5](#); [Isaiah 24:14](#); [26:5](#)) it denotes a sect, without reference to its character. Elsewhere, however, in the New Testament it has a different meaning attached to it. Paul ranks "heresies" with crimes and seditions ([Galatians 5:20](#)). This word also denotes divisions or schisms in the church ([1Corinthians 11:19](#)). In [Titus 3:10](#) a "heretical person" is one who follows his own self-willed "questions," and who is to be avoided. Heresies thus came to signify self-chosen doctrines not emanating from God ([2Peter 2:1](#)). <http://www.biblestudytools.com/>

Heresy in Scripture

¹⁹*Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, ²⁰idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, **heresies**, ²¹envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told you in time past, that **those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.** (Galatians 5:19-21)*

¹*But there were also **false prophets** among the people, even as there will be **false teachers** among you, who will secretly bring in destructive **heresies**, even **denying the Lord** who bought them, and bring on themselves swift destruction. ²And **many will follow their destructive ways**, because of whom the way of truth will be blasphemed. ³By covetousness **they will exploit you with deceptive words**; for a long time their judgment has not been*

idle, and their destruction does not slumber. (2Peter 2:1-3)

Other Definitions

Orthodox definition of heresy: taking part of the truth and making it the whole truth.

Atheism/Atheist

the doctrine or belief that there is no God.

disbelief in the existence of a supreme being or beings.

Theism

The belief in one God as the creator and ruler of the universe, without rejection of revelation (distinguished from deism).

Belief in the existence of a god or gods (opposed to atheism).

Deism

Belief in the existence of a God on the evidence of reason and nature only, with rejection of supernatural revelation (distinguished from theism).

Belief in a God who created the world but has since remained indifferent to it.

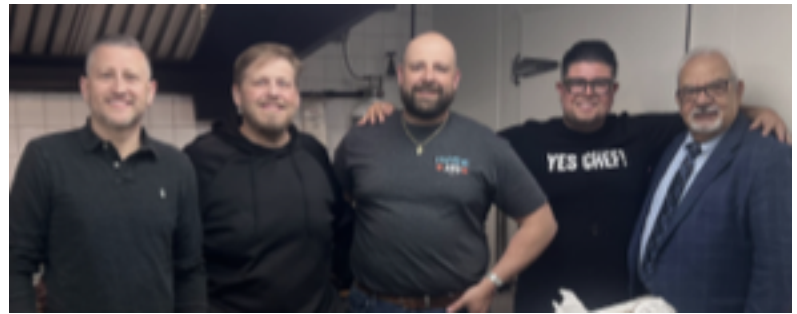

What's New This Year?

Our Greek Festival is less than three months away and the Fest organizing committee has been busy putting plans into action. Here are just a few features that will be added or returning:

- The main parking lot will be used for Festival activities, so free parking will be available at Loyola Academy (*Lake & Laramie Aves., near Edens Expy.*) Shuttle buses will take guests to/from the church, thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor. Limited valet parking will be available in our north lot.
- An expanded menu will include new items at the food, taverna/mezze and beverage tents. (*Details to follow in future updates.*)
- A supervised Kids Zone will offer a variety of fun children's activities.
- Our own SSPP dancers, directed by Anna Andrews, will perform at the Fest. A DJ will also play Greek music during the event for guests' enjoyment and dancing.
- Church tours will be conducted several times each day. In addition, as part of the church's 65th anniversary celebration, a photo gallery entitled "Our 65 Years in Photos" will be on display in the community center.

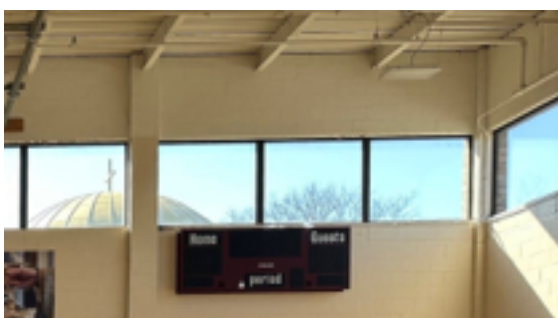

RENEWING OUR LORD'S HOUSE

The Parish approved a Capital Plan in 2019 to renew the components of our Church and Latto Center buildings. We have completed numerous major and minor projects in the last five years through your generous annual stewardship commitments and special donations without a Capital Fundraising Appeal. As we celebrate the Risen Christ, we are again busy planning and executing several projects again this year.

- The hardwood floors in the Narthex were refinished during Bright Week with a durable finish. Please take a moment to wipe off any excess moisture from your shoes as you enter.
- This year's masonry restoration and tuckpointing project will target the west facades of the main church building. The plan is to have all elevations of both buildings completed by 2028.
- The second and third of five phases to restore the entire parking lot that is thirty years old will start shortly.
- The original single pane windows in the Latto Center classrooms, office and gym will be replaced with dual pane energy efficient windows.
- Latto Center Classroom Remodeling & Furnishings project will get underway during the summer break to include new and efficient storage, new energy efficient LED lighting and new chairs and tables that are more suitable for student use.
