Greetings Brothers and Sisters:

As I write this, we're preparing for our *Greek Festival* on *July 26-27*. I wish to thank to our committee for working hard to prepare these last several months and to thank all our volunteers who helped make it as successful as possible with God's blessings!

The second annual *Annette Starr Memorial Blood Drive* was held on *July 9th* Thank you to all who supported this worthy cause.

We welcomed *Fr. Peter Sarolas* as our new associate priest with a reception on Sunday July 20th along with *Presvytera Maria* they have three sons: *Yianni, Vasili, and Stefanos*. I look forward to working with Fr. Peter to minister in preaching the Gospel, teaching the Commandments, and offering the healing power of God to all who desire health of soul and body.

Fanari Camp 2025 is complete. Around 750 children, including forty from our parish, participated during the five weeks of camp. We invite all the *campers* and *staff* from SSPP to wear their t-shirts and share

inspiring experiences on Sunday August 17th.

Agape Summer Camp concluded July 11th. And our Parish Feast Day took place on June 28-29. Thank you to our brother clergy who participated in the Vespers and Metropolitan Nathanael for presiding at the liturgy, assisted by Archdeacon Vasilios Smith. Thank you to the Philoptochos for hosting the receptions after Vespers and Divine Liturgy on Sunday!

As the month of August begins so does the *Fast of the Dormition*. This is a two-week (Aug.1-14) period of preparation before *Feast of the Falling-Asleep of the Virgin Mary* on August 15th. It is customary during this time to repeatedly celebrate the *Paraklesis services*, also known as the Supplicatory Canon in which we beseech the Mother of God to intercede to God on our behalf for strength and salvation. During the Fast, we also celebrate another Great Feast: the *Transfiguration of our Lord* on August 6th.

Like all the great feasts of our Church, we learn many *important lessons* from these two. In the *Transfiguration feast*, we become eyewitnesses with the disciples Peter,

eyewitnesses with the disciples Peter, James and John of Jesus' divine nature. Thus, as the Apolytikion says, we know that Christ suffered willingly because He had the power to bypass His crucifixion. In the Dormition feast, we are taught the eternal nature of the soul, as depicted in the icon by Christ receiving the soul of His mother in the figure of a small child. Furthermore, we are taught the future disposition and destination of the body in that the Virgin Mary was bodily assumed into heaven after her death. This makes sense that the earthly tabernacle of God would take its rightful place on the eternal heavenly altar. We seek to imitate the Virgin Mary so that we also become earthly tabernacles of Christ.

Also in August we are taking care of several *building and grounds projects* including the classroom remodel and replacing windows in the community center. The parking lot and tuckpointing were completed earlier this summer and look great!

We will have *Saturday Vespers* during the Dormition Fast August 2nd and 9th. There will not be Vespers on August 16, 23, and 30th. Regular Saturday Vespers will

The *11th Annual Solemn Vespers* for the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation aka Vespers for the Protection of the Environment will take place on *Sunday August 31st* 7pm at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic parish in Glenview. *Dr Apostolis Sambanis* will be the guest speaker that evening. In accordance with the Metropolis Vision of Growth initiative that highlights the catechumenate, we will host the usual *Fall Catechism course* on *Tuesday evenings 7-9pm* beginning *September 16th*. These classes are open to everyone, especially catechumens, seekers, inquirers and current Orthodox Christians wishing to deepen their knowledge of the Orthodox Faith.

Does God take Summer vacation? No, and neither does our parish. We are open throughout the summer and Divine Liturgies are scheduled for every Sunday and weekdays for major feasts and saints. Even though we do not have Church School classes, we should still come for Sunday Liturgy. God's guideline for giving is the tithe (10%). He gives us everything but only asks for ten percent in return. That's a pretty good deal. With a total (operations & capital) annual parish budget of \$1.7M we encourage everyone to strive towards tithing (10%) but suggest a minimum of four percent (4%) annual giving.

## MODERN HERESIES - RATIONALISM

Rationalism is the principle or habit of accepting reason as the supreme authority in matters of opinion, belief, or conduct independent of experience and unaided by divine revelation.

In epistemology, rationalism is the view that "regards reason as the chief source and test of knowledge" [1] or "any view appealing to reason as a source of knowledge or justification". [2] More formally, rationalism is defined as a methodology or a theory "in which the criterion of the truth is not sensory but intellectual and deductive". [3]

#### Age of Reason/Enlightenment

The **Enlightenment** (also known as the **Age of Enlightenment** or the **Age of Reason**; [1] was an intellectual movement which dominated the world of ideas in Europe during the 18th century.

Listen to what the Lord God says about rationalism...

<sup>8</sup>"For My thoughts are not your thoughts, Nor are your ways My ways," says the LORD. (Isaiah 55:8)

<sup>5</sup>Trust in the LORD with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding; (Proverbs 3:5)

<sup>23</sup>Thus says the LORD: "Let not the wise man glory in his wisdom, Let not the mighty man glory in his might, Nor let the rich man glory in his riches; (Jeremiah 9:23)

Our patron Apostle Paul wrote about rationalism...

<sup>18</sup>For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. <sup>19</sup>For it is written: "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, And bring to nothing the understanding of the prudent." [Isaiah 29:14] <sup>20</sup>Where is the wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the disputer of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of this world? <sup>21</sup> For since, in the wisdom of God, the world through wisdom did not know God, it pleased God through the foolishness of the message preached to save those who believe. <sup>22</sup>For Jews request a sign, and Greeks seek after wisdom; <sup>23</sup>but we preach Christ crucified, to the Jews a stumbling block and to the Greeks foolishness, <sup>24</sup>but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. <sup>25</sup>Because the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than *men.* (1Corinthians 1:19-25)

14 But the natural man does not receive the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him; nor can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned. (1Corinthians 2:14)

In the Divine Liturgy, the priest recites the **Prayer before the Gospel...** 

"Illumine our hearts, O Master Who loves mankind, with the pure light of

Thy divine knowledge. **Open the eyes** of our mind to the understanding of Thy gospel teachings. Implant also in us the fear of Thy blessed commandments, that trampling down all carnal desires, we may enter upon a spiritual manner of living, both thinking and doing such things as are well-pleasing unto Thee. For Thou art the illumination of our souls and bodies, O Christ our God, and unto Thee we ascribe glory, together with Thy Father, Who is from everlasting, and Thine all-holy, good, and life-creating Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen."

#### Question: "How should a Christian view rationalism vs. empiricism?"

Answer: Rationalism vs. empiricism is a philosophical debate about the way human beings gain knowledge. There is a wide array of theses associated with rationalism and empiricism. Empiricists look to the world outside themselves as the source of knowledge, while rationalists look to the world within themselves as the source of knowledge. The empiricist holds that we cannot truly know something without first examining the related empirical evidence—that is, what we can see, smell, hear, touch, or taste. We learn by experiencing the world around us in concrete ways. The rationalist would argue that humans have an innate knowledge that does not come from experience but simply exists within us from birth. Based on that innate knowledge, the rationalist

also holds that humans can reason toward new knowledge. The debate between rationalism and empiricism focuses on the divide between using the scientific method and one's own rationale (independent of external evidence) to arrive at "truth."

Closely related to rationalism, is **Scholasticism** 

Scholasticism is a method of critical thought which dominated teaching by the academics ("scholastics," or "schoolmen") of medieval universities in Europe from about 1100 to 1700 CE, and a program of employing that method in articulating and defending dogma in an increasingly pluralistic context. It originated as an outgrowth of and a departure from Christian monastic schools at the earliest European universities.[1]

Scholasticism is not so much a philosophy or a theology as a method of learning, as it places a strong emphasis on dialectical reasoning to extend knowledge by inference and to resolve contradictions.

The terms "scholastic" and "scholasticism" derive from the Latin word scholasticus and the latter from the Greek σχολαστικός,  $[\underline{5}]$  which means "that [which] belongs to the school". The "scholastics" were, roughly, "schoolmen".

The Church Fathers of Orthodox Christianity had a different approach to learning called Apophasis which is. knowledge, understanding, or description of God through negative whatever things are pure, whatever with Cataphasis which is knowledge, understanding, or description of God through positive statements about qualities and characteristics that God possesses, as "God is good."

One can only say speak positively about God by what He reveals about Himself. Otherwise, we can only approach knowledge of Him through negative/apophatic statements.

In addition, the Church Fathers were very skeptical regarding rational thoughts, or what they call the Logoismoi. One must be very cautious about what thoughts they entertain, engage and converse with in their mind. Again, knowledge was not supposed to be a discursive exercise of the intellect. Rather, knowledge came through revelation from God when the mind (nous) was properly prepared through spiritual askesis (prayer, fasting, worship, almsgiving, repentance, confession, etc.). Listen to what the Apostle Paul says...

<sup>2</sup>And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God. (Romans 12:2)

<sup>8</sup>Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just,

statements about qualities and things are lovely, whatever things characteristics that God does not are of good report, if there is any possess, such as "God is not confined virtue and if there is anything by space or time." This is contrasted praiseworthy--meditate on these things. (Philippians 4:8)

> <sup>21</sup> if indeed you have heard Him and have been taught by Him, as the truth is in Jesus: <sup>22</sup>that you put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts,

> <sup>23</sup> and be renewed in the spirit of your mind, <sup>24</sup> and that you put on the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness. (Ephesians 4:21-24)

> Again, in the Divine Liturgy, the priest prays the First Prayer of the Faithful (right before the Great Entrance)...

O God, great and praised, through the life-giving death of Your Christ, You have borne us from corruption to immortality. Liberate all our senses [aistheseis] from killing passion, setting over them as a benevolent sovereign our inner reason [endothen logismon]. Let the eye be averted from every evil sight, and the ear be deaf to idle talk. May the tongue be purged of unseemly speech. Purify these lips that praise You, Lord. Make our hands abstain from wicked deeds, doing only such things as are pleasing to You, thus sealing with Your grace all our members, and our mind [dianoian].

And The Second Prayer of the Faithful...

Holy Master, infinitely good, we entreat You, rich in mercy, to be gracious to us sinners, and to make us worthy to receive Your only Son and our God, the King of Glory. For behold, His spotless body and lifegiving blood are about to make their entrance at this hour, to be laid on this mystical table, invisibly attended by a multitude of the heavenly host [stratias]. Grant that we may receive them in blameless communion, so that as the eyes [omma] of our understanding [dianoias] see the light, we may become children of light and of day.

And the **Prayer of Completion Litany** (after the Great Entrance)...

O God of ineffable and unseen mysteries, in You are hidden the treasures of wisdom [Sophia] and knowledge [gnoseos], yet You have revealed [apokalypsas] to us this Liturgy and, in Your great love for mankind, appointed us sinners to offer gifts and sacrifices to You, for our sins and for the failings of the people. Invisible King, You perform works great and inscrutable, glorious and extraordinary, beyond number. Look upon us Your undeserving servants as we stand, as at Your throne of the Cherubim at this Your holy altar, where Your only-begotten Son, our God, rests in the awesome mysteries here offered. Freeing us all, and Your faithful people, of all uncleanness, sanctify all of us, soul and body, with a sanctification that cannot be taken away. Thus, partaking of these divine Blessings with pure conscience [syneidoti], faces unblushing, hearts enlightened, and being quickened [zwopoioumenoi] by them, we may be united to Your Christ Himself, our true God. For He said: "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood, abides in me and I in him. " Having Your Word indwelling and moving within us, we may thus become the temple of Your all-holy and worshipful Spirit, free of every wide of the Evil One affecting our acts, our words, our thoughts [kata dianoian], and so obtain the blessings promised to us as to Your Saints who have pleased You through the ages.

As we have seen in our series about Modern Heresies, there are no new false teachings, just old ones wrapped in new packaging. Rationalism started with the ancient Greeks, continued with the Gnostics of the second century and still exists to this day. It was a heresy then; it is still a heresy.






