Each September 1st starts the new Church calendar year. It's called the *Indiction*. The custom extends back to the practice of the Israelites who celebrated the new vear on a moveable feast in September. This could have an agricultural origin in that the harvest was complete by September and new seeds would resumes in September be planted. September I^{St} is the date traditionally commemorating the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. On that day, after being baptized and chrismated, after fasting for 40 days and nights in the wilderness, He enters the local synagogue and reads from the Prophecy of Isaiah. The event is recorded in the Gospel of Luke 4:16-22. The Emperor Constantine formalized the practice in the Roman Empire fixing the date on Sept 1st and it continued until the Fall of Constantinople in 1453. This year, September 1 falls on Monday Labor Day holiday, so

> On September 8^{th} , we celebrate the great feast for the Nativity of the Theotokos.

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

PASTORAL MESSAGE

FROM FATHER RICK

On Sunday September 14th we celebrate the Universal **Exaltation of the Holy Cross** with Divine Liturgy and a special procession. This is a strict fast day in commemoration of the Lord's crucifixion.

In accordance with the Metropolis Vision of Growth initiative that highlights the catechumenate, we will host the usual *Fall Catechism course* on *Tuesday evenings 7-9pm* beginning *September 16th*. These classes are open to everyone, especially catechumens, seekers, inquirers and current Orthodox Christians wishing to deepen their knowledge of the Orthodox Faith.

Several *building and grounds projects* including the classroom remodel and replacing windows in the community center were recently completed just in time for new school year.

The 2025 Archdiocese **Stewardship** Theme is "See Our Church as it Could Be." A secondary, related theme is "Your Own from Your Own, We Offer to You." The latter is the petition/prayer from the Divine Liturgy when the priest raises the gifts of bread and wine. The point is whatever we give to God is not really ours. Rather it is a gift from Him that we offer back to Him with thanksgiving.

Some parishioners did not give in 2024 and some have not yet given in 2025. Stewardship giving statements were mailed in mid-July. Please give now and give regularly. We appreciate monthly gifts. https://onrealm.org/ssppglenview/-/form/give/now

God's guideline for giving is the tithe (10%). He gives us everything but only asks for ten percent in return. That's a pretty good deal. With a total (operations & capital) annual parish budget of \$1.7M we encourage everyone to strive towards tithing (10%) but suggest a minimum of four percent (4%) annual giving.

Pluralism- for our purposes is defined as the "acceptance of all religious paths as equally valid." And this begs the questions: is the existence of so many religions part of God's will? Also, how Orthodox relates or should relate to other religions, both Christian and non-Christian? We'll briefly examine religious pluralism, ecumenism, and the Orthodox Christian view of other religions from various sources. Finally, we'll look at what the Jesus and the Apostles say in the Holy Scriptures. Essentially, Orthodoxy rejects the idea that all religions are equally valid. However, Orthodox live in a pluralistic world and see it as an opportunity to witness the truefaith in Christ Jesus.

Religious pluralism is an attitude or policy regarding the diversity of <u>religious belief systems</u> coexisting in society. It can indicate one or more of the following:

- As the name of the worldview according to which one's religion is not the sole and exclusive source of truth, and thus the acknowledgement that at least some truths and true values exist in other religions.
- As acceptance of the concept that two or more religions with mutually exclusive truth claims are equally valid. This may be considered a form of either toleration (a concept

that arose as a result of the European wars of religion) or moral relativism.

- The understanding that the exclusive claims of different religions turn out, upon closer examination, to be variations of universal truths that have been taught since time immemorial. This is called *Perennialism* (based on the concept of *philosophia perennis*) or Traditionalism.
- Sometimes as a synonym for ecumenism, i.e., the promotion of some level of unity, co-operation, and improved understanding between different religions or different denominations within a single religion.
- As a term for the condition of harmonious co-existence between adherents of different <u>religions</u> or religious denominations.
- · As a <u>social norm</u> and not merely a synonym for religious diversity. [1]

Religious pluralism can be defined as "respecting the otherness of others". Freedom of religion encompasses all religions acting within the law in a particular region. Exclusivist religions teach that theirs is the only way to salvation and to religious truth, and some of them would even argue that it is necessary to suppress the

falsehoods taught by other religions. Some Protestant sects argue fiercely against Roman Catholicism, and fundamentalist Christians of all kinds teach that religious practices like those of paganism and witchcraft are pernicious. This was a common historical attitude prior to the Enlightenment, and has appeared as governmental policy into the present day under systems like Afghanistan's Talibanregime, which destroyed the ancient Buddhas of Bamyan.

Relativism, the belief that all religions are equal in their value and that none of the religions give access to absolute truth, is an extreme form of <u>inclusivism</u>.

[5] Likewise, <u>syncretism</u>, the attempt to take over creeds of practices from other religions or even to blend practices or creeds from different religions into one new faith is an extreme form of inter-religious dialogue. <u>Syncretism</u> must not be confused with <u>ecumenism</u>, the attempt to bring closer and eventually reunite different denominations of one religion that have a common origin but were separated by a <u>schism</u>. <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Religious pluralism</u>

Ecumenism refers to efforts by Christians of different church traditions to develop closer relationships and better understandings. The term is also often used to refer to efforts

towards the visible and organic unity of different Christian churches in some form.

The adjective *ecumenical* can also be a p p l i e d t o a n y interdenominational initiative that encourages greater cooperation among Christians and their <u>churches</u>, whether or not the specific aim of that effort is full, visible unity.

The terms *ecumenism* and *ecumenical* come from the <u>Greek</u> οἰκουμένη (*oikoumene*), which means "the whole inhabited world", and was historically used with specific reference to the <u>Roman Empire</u>. [2] The ecumenical vision comprises both the search for the visible unity of the Church (Ephesians 4:3) and the "whole inhabited earth" (Matthew 24:14) as the concern of all Christians.

In Christianity the qualification ecumenical is originally (and still) used in terms such as "ecumenical council" and "Ecumenical Patriarch" in the meaning of pertaining to the totality of the larger Church (such as the Catholic Church or the Orthodox Church) rather than being restricted to one of its constituent local churches or dioceses. Used in this original sense, the term carries no connotation of reuniting the historically separated Christian denominations, but presumes a unity of local congregations in a worldwide

October 2002 in Brookline, MA - The International Conference entitled "The Orthodox Churches in a Pluralistic World: An Ecumenical Conversation" opened on Thursday, October 3 with the keynote address of His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios, Primate of the Greek Orthodox Church in America. The conference, which is jointly sponsored by Holy Cross and the World Council of Churches, and presented in cooperation with the Boston Theological Institute and the Initiatives in Religion and Public Life at Harvard Divinity School, includes presentations by many renowned theologians and scholars who have come together to address the challenge of globalization, issues of human rights, religious violence, ethnicity and nationalism, and Christian missions

In his address, Archbishop Demetrios acknowledged that "In a period of rapid globalization, in a world community that is increasingly conscious of its pluralistic character, the Orthodox Churches meet a great challenge." He stated, however, "that the word challenge is to be understood in the most positive and optimistic sense. The pluralistic world is not an obstacle to Orthodoxy; it is rather

an opportunity. In a pluralistic global society, the Orthodox Church is challenged to match her incarnational Christology with an equally incarnational ecclesiology."

After presenting a short analysis of the nature of the challenge and its context, he offered three distinct suggestions for responding to the "pluralistic challenge". First, he affirmed Pentecost as a model of response, as Orthodox Churches have labored through the centuries to adapt language and liturgy to the specific needs and cultural elements of local communities. Second, he affirmed the Orthodox concept of personhood, an understanding that is critical in this age of globalization. Finally, he acknowledged the need for a parish pluralism, a model of community church life rooted in the Eucharist, engaged socially, and exemplifying unity in diversity.

The approach taken in this paper is to emphasize "the middle way," that of inclusivism. It seems clear that the way of exclusivism is properly rejected as a matter of Truth. At the other extreme, the thin ice of cultural pluralism is fraught with danger.

It is a strongly held Orthodox view that our commitment to Christian Truth affirms a pluralistic, democratic setting where all people can live in peace and harmony. Holding fast to the truth of Christianity, Orthodoxy defends the right of all religious expressions to co-exist harmoniously, in a setting of freedom, where equal protection is afforded to all under the law. In the post-modern pluralistic world there is no truth, right, good and beauty which all human beings are created to discover, know and believe; to which they are called to conform in thought, word and deed; in which they are privileged to delight and rejoice; and for which they are blessed to give glory and thanksgiving to God. There is no meaning and purpose for all. There is rather a creation of reality, or rather, more accurately, many creations of a plethora of pseudo-realities, produced by the subjective willings of individuals, parties and "interest groups" in the context of politics, power, selfcreation and permissiveness. The tenets of modern liberal democracy now become objects of worship and ends in themselves in a politicized, hedonized world. Freedom

becomes licence. Acquisition becomes a right. Differences are deified. And happiness, now understood as material and pseudo-spiritual pleasure, becomes obligatory for all. (Hopko)

If more than a half century ago H. Richard Neibuhr could say that in modern American liberal Protestantism "a God without wrath brings man without sin into a kingdom without judgment through the ministrations of a Christ without a cross" (The Kingdom of God in America, 1937, p. 193), it can now be said that in the new age of mostmodern pluralism divinity without sovereignty brings humans without dignity into an age without responsibility through the exploitation of a god or goddess of your choice without tragedy. Four unacceptable responses to Post-Modern Pluralism: 1) deny that it exists, 2) deny that our people and churches are immune to its effects, 3) retreat into selfmade or self-contained refuge, 4) we must not fall prey to the postmodern pluralistic worldview as some great new opportunity for humankind which Orthodox Christians should welcome as being inherently consistent with traditional Orthodox views of freedom, personal dignity, cultural diversity, incarnational theology and apophatic mystical

Itheology; and our equally traditional (if sometimes facile and superficial) criticisms of "Western" rationalism, pietism, legalism and moralism. (Hopko) http://www.svots.edu/content/orthodoxy-post-modern-pluralistic-societies

8 "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. ⁹ Six days you shall labor and do all your work, ¹⁰ but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God. In it you shall do no work: you, nor your son, nor your daughter, nor your male servant, nor your female servant, nor your cattle, nor your stranger who is within vour gates. 11 For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it. (Exodus 20:1-11)

 14 Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness? 15 And what accord has Christ with Belial? Or what part has a believer with an unbeliever? 16 And what agreement has the temple of God with idols? For you are the temple of the living God. As God has said: "I will dwell in them and walk among them. I will be their God, And they shall be My people." [Jeremiah 32:38; Ezekiel 37:27] ¹⁷ Therefore, "Come out from among them and be separate, says the Lord. Do

not touch what is unclean, And I will receive you." ¹⁸ "I will be a Father to you, and you shall be My sons and daughters, Says the Lord Almighty." (2Cor.6:14-18)

⁹ As we have said before, so now I say again, if anyone preaches any other gospel to you than what you have received, let him be accursed. ¹⁰ For do I now persuade men, or God? Or do I seek to please men? For if I still pleased men, I would not be a bondservant of Christ. 11 But I make known to you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached by me is not according to man. 12 For I neither received it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through the revelation of Jesus Christ. 

A big thanks to all involved in the preparation and hosting of this major fundraiser. It was especially heartwarming to see so many youth, teens and young adults stepping up to help - and having a great time doing it!

Our SSPP Youth Dancers, under the direction of Anna Andrews, did a phenomenal job of entertaining the crowds on both days. They stayed on the floor to teach a traditional dance to many enthusiastic Festival guests.

Most importantly, despite the hot temperatures, almost all guests and volunteers left the Fest with smiles on their faces - a good sign they'll be returning next year!



TANZANIA WATER PROJECT UPDATE

In November of 2024, as part of Coffee Connection's outreach ministry as a Local Eucharistic Community, we decided to commit to assist 2 Greek Orthodox Churches in California (St. Barbara in Santa Barbara and St. Paul in Irvine) with regard to their truly wonderful ministry of providing fresh water for communities in Tanzania, Africa through building, repairing and maintaining wells in remote villages. We dedicated a fund for this project and welcomed the whole parish to join us in this initiative. AND WE WERE NOT DISAPPOINTED!!! A <u>BIG THANK YOU</u> to the people who have donated money to provide fresh water for communities in Tanzania, Africa through building, repairing and maintaining wells! Our donations thus far have totaled \$30,199.00 so we are well past our goal of \$10,000!!! GLORY TO GOD! We praise God for His gifts that He blesses us to share! With that amount, we hope to help build 2-3 new wells (\$9,000 each) and have money left over to repair nonfunctioning wells (\$700 each). Of course, the outreach ministry of St. Barbara's Greek Orthodox Church in California will be making the final decision on the best use of the money. Once we are notified by St. Barbara's outreach ministry regarding where this money will be used, we will have updates in future Messengers about the progress being made. 


